



## About Kanekoa


Kanekoa is one of Hawaii's premier live music experiences. Maui's Nā Hōkū Hanohano (Hawai'i's "Grammy")
Award-winning band Kanekoa fuses eclectic roots with flavors of reggae, blues, funk, jazz, Hawaiian, and island music with jamband energy. Playing 'ukulele-powered "Hawaiian jam-rock" and pushing the envelope of Hawaii's joyful 4-string instrument, soulful singer Kaulana Kanekoa on rhythm uke, phenom Vince Esquire on lead 'ukulele, and master of the U-Bass Don Lopez, are joined by Travis Rice on cajon to round out their unique sound.

Original songs mix with jamband interpretations that continue to surprise and delight audiences and fans. Powered by electric 'ukuleles and driving rhythms, these 'ukulele masters draw inspiration from the Hawaiian roots of this instrument as well as their love of multiple music genres, from traditional Hawaiian to 80's Pop to Jamband Blues, creating a sound unmistakably their own. Kanekoa has been celebrated on the cover and feature article of Ukulele Magazine as "Hawaiian Trailblazers."


Vince was exposed to music at an early age by his father, he picked up the uke at seven and by 15 was blazing on guitar.

Uncle Don Lopez has been a staple on the Maui music scene anchoring Hawaiian music legend Willie K on bass for years. Don also played and toured with Vince's blues band for many years, which created a musical bond between the two. Don is a virtuoso on the bass and can play anything. His fretless Kala U-Bass adds a dynamic groove to the ukes that rounds out the Kanekoa sound.



Backing Vocals

Percussionist Travis Rice was inspired by

the Grateful Dead's improvisational approach. "I had never heard a band that would purposely lose time and play with that," Rice recalls. He eventually gravitated to the cajon (which fittingly has four strings inside). "The cajon is perfect for what we're doing," he says.
