It can be overwhelming to sit down and try to write a poem. Remember that it doesn't need to be perfect on the first try. If you're stuck, write down everything you can think of. Even if it's messy, this can lead to really great ideas. Try a variety of strategies and exercises, and figure out what works for you! Just as there's no single or 'correct' definition of poetry, there is also no single or 'correct' way to write a poem.
